A Librarian and a Parent Talk about Dyslexia	Nan Carmack and Rebecca Warner	Explore the world of your students with dyslexia. Join Nan Carmack, librarian at the Library of Virginia, and Rebecca Warner, parent and Decoding Dyslexia VA advocate, to learn about the real life challenges of encouraging reading in students with dyslexia and collaborating with their teachers. Learn about resources available for professional development; bibliographies for parents and students; and anecdotal experiences of a parent.
Staying Legal in a Pandemic: Crucial Copyright Issues for Instruction	Joyce Johnston	Preparing materials for online instruction places special legal pressures on librarians and the teachers they advise. This session identifies key issues in copyright and intellectual property in a virtual environment, starting with the 3 central laws. It covers faculty/staff rights to the "directed works" they have created, such as lesson plans, to support instruction. This includes social media posts and videos. It also summarizes legal use of others' works, such as images and excerpts of texts or articles. Finally, it highlights key educational exemptions, such as format shifting of legacy videos or instructional materials to conform to a student's IEP.
